4 Common Themes Across 3 Reports

1. IES is underfunded and overburdened
2. IES must continue to invest in equitable education research
3. IES must operate together rather than in silos
4. The National Board of Education Sciences (NBES) must be populated as soon as possible

1. Prior to largescale undertaking of recommendations, NBES should be populated.
2. NCES needs increased funding before it can begin to expand data sources for new insights.
3. Supports recommendation to assist SEAs and LEAs with data facilitation.
