Criminal Justice Administrative Records System (CJARS)

- Data infrastructure project to support the next generation of statistics and research on the criminal justice system
- Partnership between Census Bureau and University of Michigan (UM) started in 2016
- UM collects and harmonizes state and local criminal justice data
- At Census Bureau, these data can be linked to survey and administrative records



CJARS project goals

- Collect, harmonize, and link longitudinal, multi-jurisdictional CJ data to track individuals and cases across space and time
- Enable timely and innovative federal statistical products about CJ system and justice-involved population
- Provide national research platform for qualified researchers on approved projects



CJARS stakeholders

- University of Michigan acquires and harmonizes data from criminal justice agencies, including law enforcement, judicial, and corrections agencies
- **Census Bureau** links CJARS with other socioeconomic data to build data products for data providers, develop new data products, and improve operations
- Qualified **researchers** on approved projects analyze anonymized CJARS data in the FSRDCs
- **Communities and policymakers** use CJARS-derived statistical products to understand the performance of the criminal justice system



CJARS data coverage

- >300 data providers
- >1000 counties
- States with coverage of state court, state DOC, and/or state repository represent >59% of U.S. population
- 3b records
- 177m CJ events
- 38m unique individuals



CJARS innovations in this session

- Offense classification tool supports work at other agencies and projects
- Automated data quality methods enable a small staff to harmonize data from many agencies
- Important research demonstrates the value of using CJARS within the Census Bureau's Data Linkage Infrastructure
